9) Partnering with older people for quality assessment of aged care by Professor Julie Ratcliffe Julie is Matthew Flinders Professor of Health Economics and leads the Health and Social Care Economics Group in the Caring Futures Institute at Flinders University. She is an internationally recognised leader in the measurement and valuation of health and quality of life outcomes. Julie will talk about the expanded aged care 'National Quality indicators Program' which now incorporates several non-clinical measures related to quality of care and quality of life.

12) Biosecurity issues: how and why they concern the home gardener – or should! by **Barbara Hall** Barbara Hall worked for approx. 45 years in various roles with the Department of Agriculture and then SARDI (South Australian Research & Development Institute). Most of her work was on disease identification and management in horticultural crops, identifying issues and researching ways to manage disease and providing extension to growers. She was heavily involved with biosecurity and spent over 15 years on a national committee (as an inaugural member and later chair), developing standards for identification of plant pest of biosecurity concern. With excellent judgement she retired in December 2019 and continues part time with mentoring, report editing and providing technical advice when requested!

Her talk will look at why home gardeners should be concerned about plant biosecurity issues. While they are not as emotive as animal or human issues and hardly ever make the news, plants have regular "pandemics" and everyone should be aware.

### 21) Robotics and Artificial Systems

### by Associate Professor Russell Brinkworth

Dr Brinkworth has had over a decade of postdoctoral research, teaching and administration experience in a wide variety of areas, all concentrated on the use of technology to understand, interact with and predict the world.

Most people are familiar with the historic aphorism "the biggest problem with common sense is that it is not common". An apt counterpart to this sentiment for the modern age is "the biggest problem with artificial intelligence (AI) is that it is not intelligent". The hallmark of a successful biological organism is its ability to adapt to many different environmental conditions, something that has been missing in many robotic systems to date. In fact, the inability to correctly respond to the wide variety of conditions that are faced in the real-world is one of the key things currently holding back the wide-spread use of autonomous vehicles and robot butlers.

This presentation will explore the opportunities within robotics to take inspiration from biological systems and create truly adaptable artificial systems that better perform the tasks we require of them."

# 26) Current Legislation covering Heritage Buildings in Adelaide
